

CHELMSFORD, August 1.
Last Monday was married at Aldgate church Whitecap, Mr. John Martin, grocer, of Bails Place, Tower-hill, to Miss Suffanah Ady of Writtle. Yesterday died Mr. Sargeant of Writtle; he was formerly a considerable farmer at Wiford. Yesterday morning died, in the 22d year of his age, Mr. Thomas Chevely, of Melting Lodge. Last Monday several persons of this town, and neighbourhood, were summoned before a magistrate, for letting horses to hire without being duly licensed according to act of parliament, when one person was convicted in the penalty of 10s. and two others in the mitigated penalty of 5s. each with costs. A gentleman hop merchant, by letter 25th of July, informs a friend in town, that during all his journey through Kent, Surrey, Hampshire, and different parts of Essex, which afforded general signs of a plentiful year, he saw no grounds that promised numerous a crop, and had to thrifty and flourishing an appearance as those of Cattle Hedingham. Those who grow hops must make entry at the Excise-office this day, or for such neglect they are liable to be prosecuted.

HARWICH, August 1.
A letter from Vienna, dated July 9, says, The celebrated Paul Jones arriving at Cherfon, at the time when the Prince of Nassau was making preparations to attack the Turkish fleet, in the mouth of the Dnieper, the 10th of June, requested permission of the Prince to serve that day in the quality of a volunteer, which was agreed to, with the approbation of the whole fleet. Although the above advantage over the Turkish fleet may not have been so decisive as to be celebrated as a great victory; it is however considered here as a glorious one, on account of its being obtained by the Russian fleet; besides, it would have given courage to our enemies, if their first trial had not been so unprofitable. The Turks are continually making approaches upon our advanced posts at Befchania, and are as often obliged to retire with loss. On the 21st of June a number of men and women, who had taken refuge in the forests from the cruelty of the Turks, and had been exposed to hunger, having applied to our army for succour, a lieutenant, at the head of a detachment, conducted them to Kuliffch. A letter from Warfaw, dated the 2d ult. says, According to the most recent advices we have received, the Pacha of Choczim having refused to accept the capitulation offered him, Prince Cobourg and General de Solतिकow, who passed the Niefter the 28th of June, had returned to attack that place on both sides at once. Count de Romanzow and Prince Reppin have also passed that river, and a junction was expected to take place between the Russians and the Imperialists, by the 30th of the same month.

Gen. Fabris writes word, that just as he was finishing his dispatches, dated Hermandad, July 25, he received an account, that Col. Horvath was marching with his regiment on the 10th from Petruftan, towards Adchud, he was attacked on all sides by near 30000 Turks, and that, after a most obstinate contest, he put them to flight, leaving 300 of the enemy dead on the field, and several hundreds wounded. A more circumstantial account of this affair is expected, together with the loss we have sustained. Capt. Vaida was killed; we can also reckon about 35 foot, 18 hussars, and some volunteers, that are missing; but, at present, we are ignorant of their fate.

SUFFOLK AND NORFOLK NEW WOOL BILL.
DOUBTS having arisen in the Minds of some, as to the meaning of the clause in the New Wool Bill, which directs what steps are necessary to be taken in order to convert wool wools, although the said clause, so far as the duties referred to, is expressed in the same words as in 1st of William and Mary, cap. 32. It is thought proper to advertise all persons concerned, that it will be necessary for them, in order to make the lighterman, or owner of waggon, &c. their agent, to leave a letter, signed by the place from which the wool is to be conveyed to the lighterman, or owner of waggon, &c. instructing him to be careful to make a due entry, at the custom house at Lynn, or other feaport, specifying how many cloths of wool are on the wagon, together with the weight, mark, and number of each cloth, before the said wool shall arrive within Five miles of Lynn, or other feaport.

The lighterman, or owner of waggon, &c. carrying such wool, being furnished with such letter, must be careful to procure the above-mentioned entry to be made at the custom house at Lynn, or other feaport, and obtain a certificate thereof, before the wool arrives within Five miles of such port.

The hipper at Lynn, or other port, will of course be furnished with a letter as usual.
